Who are the Peer Volunteers?

The Peer are a network of LADWP employees from all backgrounds who have come together through their own recovery to assist others who also have the desire to become clean and sober. They are men and women who are either themselves in recovery or have a loved one who is in recovery. Each Peer has been clean and sober for at least two years, with some having over 20 years. The Peers are not medical professionals but have 24/7 access to a licensed mental health and addiction specialist.

All of the Peer Volunteers have personally experienced the judgement, shame and guilt that come with having a substance abuse problem; and they are here to help.

Who is eligible to call a Peer Volunteer?

All LADWP employees and their immediate family or dependents can call any of the Peer Volunteers.

Does it cost anything to call?

No. The service is free to all employees and their dependents.

Is it confidential?

<u>Yes!</u> The Peer Volunteers will not share your information with anyone else without your permission, including other Peers.

How do I contact a Peer?

The Peer's contact information can be found on our website: www.ladwpcares.org or www.local18cares.org . They are available by phone 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Can family members call a Peer?

Absolutely. We understand that alcohol and substance abuse affects all members of the family, not just the person using.

If you or a family member is struggling with substance abuse, consider the questions below:

- Have you tried to cut back on your drinking or drug use without success, or with only limited success?
- Have you become annoyed by others criticizing your drinking or drug use?
- Have you experienced feelings of guilt regarding your drinking or drug use?
- Have you felt like you needed a "fix" first thing in the morning (eye-opener) just to steady your nerves or to relieve a hangover?

A "yes" answer to 2 or more of these questions is considered clinically significant.
